Once your design is complete please write a sentence or two about your hat. When would you wear your hat? Why did you pick the design you have? Does it have any special features? How does it feel on your head?




# Supporting Understanding of the World

# Supporting Literacy

In the story Hamilton meets some different types of animals.


Giraffe, Crocodile, Monkey and Mouse

Choose one of these creatures and create a factsheet about them. Where do they live? What do they eat? How old can they live? How big can they grow? How many different types are there? Do they have any predators? Do they have any special skills? How do they protect themselves?



# Supporting Mathematical Understanding

Part-Part-Whole – Use Hamilton and his juggling hats to help you come up with different ways to make numbers. How many ways can you think of to make – 6,7,8,9 and 10? You can use objects to help you count – like Lego bricks or sweets! (Yummy maths!) Use the template at the end of this PowerPoint. There is an example below.



# Supporting Personal and Social Development

During the story, Hamilton realises he is determined, brave, patient and kind.

Talk with your grown up about what these words mean.
Can you think of a time you were determined?
Can you think of a time you were brave?
Can you think of a time when you had to be patient?
Can you think of a time when you have been kind?

What act of kindness could you do today? Are there any jobs around the house that you could help out with?



# Supporting Physical Development

The monkeys in the story were very good at ball skills. This week have fun practising your throwing and catching skills.

Can you create your own game using a ball? How many times can you throw and catch a ball without dropping it?

Can you create a target game, using objects for skittles? How high can you throw and catch the ball? (Outside!!) Can anyone in your family juggle? Maybe you can learn together?

## Supporting Literacy







Can you carry on this new part of the story?


One day Hamilton was outside in the garden wearing his colourful feathery hat. All of a sudden a bird swooped down and plucked the hat from his head.............
