


Listen to the story and have a chat about it with your adult.

I look forward to seeing some of your amazing writing. Perhaps you could illustrate your part of the book too with an amazing drawing of the spider meeting your new animal.



Can you write a factsheet all about spiders?


You might want to find out some of the following: How many legs do they have?

Can you work out how many legs there are?




Can you make up your own mini-beast maths?

Close your eyes and see if you can spend a few minutes thinking about this question. Perhaps you can write about your answer or draw a picture of it.


What are the most important things in your life?



Supporting Physical Development



Using one piece of A4 paper only and a pair of scissors can you cut your paper in one continuous strip to make the longest piece of spider web thread?




Supporting Mathematical Understanding

There are loads of different species of spiders. Choose a country somewhere in the world and find out what spiders they have there. Draw and write about your spider.
















Parts of an Insect Game Take turns to roll the dice and collect the parts of the insect. Cover the parts with a counter. The first one to cover all the parts is the winner!
