

Stay safe, have fun, be bee-rilliant!



Can you write a list of rules for your game, so that Norman does not forget how to play it?


Remember to use your phonics mats to help you with your sounds, if you get stuck.

The bees talk to each other by dancing to explain where the best flowers are to collect nectar and pollen. Set up an assault course in your house or garden and use your communication skills to explain to your family members what they have to do. You could even use a stopwatch to time each other and make it a competition!









Supporting Mathematical Understanding


Bees create honeycomb which is made of beeswax. Each little compartment is carefully built and used to store honey or lay eggs in to create more bees! Can you see what shape each compartment is?



Yes, it is a hexagon. Hexagons are a shape that you can join together easily, without any gaps to create a pattern. This is called a tessellating pattern. Have an experiment with some different shapes and see if you can create a tessellating pattern.

You can create some amazing artwork using the idea of tessellation. Take a look at some of these and see if they give you any good ideas to create your own artwork. You could paint, print, draw and colour shapes to create your pattern. Will you use one shape or two? Will it be a simple shape or something a little more adventurous?

Supporting Physical Development

Bees love flowers and help them to grow and make seeds by carrying pollen from one plant to the next as they visit them. This is called pollination.

Today I have a walking challenge for you. Getting outside and moving is great for your health. I want you to take a walk in your local area. You can look at the maps that I have attached and see if you can plot the walk that you want to take and follow the map as you go.

Secondly, on your walk I would like you to see if you can spot a rainbow of flowers. Can you find a flower or plant that represents each colour of the rainbow?

Remember to stay safe and keep a 2 metre distance between you and others. That's like 3 or 4 giant steps. Maybe you could measure 2m and see what it looks like.

I went for a walk in my local area to see what flowers I could find. I made this rainbow picture to share with your all! Have fun on your walk!
