Wyburns Primary School is a Rights Respecting School. Our policies are underpinned by the UNCRC.

Article 29 (goals of education)

- Education must develop every child's personality, talents and abilities to the full. It must encourage the child's respect for human rights, as well as respect for their parents, their own and other cultures, and the environment.

The Lockdown Procedure is activated in the unusual circumstance where children are endangered if they leave the safety of the school.

- Although it is important to be prepared and have Lockdown procedures in place, it is vital that the children's welfare is considered throughout. The procedure needs to consider which members of staff need to be informed, depending on the type of occurrence to ensure that key staff are informed without unnecessarily alarming students or other staff.
- Alarming/concerning students when unnecessary may cause them to become scared and develop a fear of going to school.
- Communication is a key aspect in these situations so make sure that all emergency numbers are close to hand.
- Standard practice is not to comment to any member of the public until a plan of action is determined by the Senior Leadership Team.

Incidents that may require lockdown:

- Animal on site- dog - Level 1
- Police incident in the town - Level 2
- Facilities Incident - Gas leak, power failure - Level 2
- Stranger on site - Level 3
- Terror threat - Level 3
- Air pollution - Level 2

<p>Internal message systems- Google Chat - All teachers. LOCKDOWN typed in capital letters</p> <p>Word of mouth - One LOCKDOWN</p> <p>Whistle blown by SLT- Five long whistles in:</p> <p>If incident is located outside of main SLT space, teacher to blow five long whistles.</p> <p>If in lockdown and fire alarm goes off, wait for chat to message 'STAY' or 'EVACUATE'.</p>	<p>Internal message systems</p>

Security lockdown plan

<p>Our safe assembly points</p>	<p>Visitors are escorted to the staffroom, if safe to do so or enter the nearest classroom.</p> <p>Pupils and staff remain in class or move to the closest classroom and lock the door</p>
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	<p>from the inside. Pupils and staff at Spring Gardens are to remain in the Pavilion.</p>
<p>Secure entrance and exit points</p>	<p>Windows closed by staff/blinds down</p> <p>Gates remain locked</p> <p>Office hatch closed</p>
<p>Bring pupils inside</p>	<p>5 long whistle blows in each building</p> <p>Staff line up class and move into the building calmly</p> <p>Take register within classroom</p>
<p>Steps to increase protection</p>	<p>Lock and screen doors</p> <p>Position children away from sightlines from external doors and windows – for example, under a desk</p> <p>Turn off lights and monitors</p> <p>Make sure mobile phones and electronic devices are on silent, or turned off</p> <p>Turn off fans or mobile air conditioning units (this will reduce noise and the risk of exposure to any chemical or pollution)</p> <p>Cover windows and air vents (if the risk is pollution or a gas cloud)</p>

<p>Internal communication during a lockdown</p>	<p>Google chat is used to communicate</p> <p>LOCKDOWN</p>
<p>Communication with parents/carers during a lockdown</p>	<p>Parents will be informed via text once the immediate threat has gone.</p> <p>Parents will be asked not to call the school, as this will tie up lines that would be used to contact emergency services, and not to come to the school.</p>
<p>Arrangements for pupils or staff with additional needs</p>	<p>Break out spaces within locked classrooms will be used</p> <p>Depending on circumstances, free movement within the building may be permitted.</p>
<p>Lockdown duration</p>	<p>The school should remain in a state of lockdown until a senior member of staff or the emergency services confirm that it has been lifted.</p>

<p>Evacuation plan, if needed</p> <p>Remember that it is very much the exception to evacuate a building in the event of a hostile intruder. Unless the location of the intruder is known, a "blind" evacuation may be putting people in more danger than if they had remained within the building.</p>	<p>If an evacuation is needed, SLT will communicate verbally and via Google chat.</p> <p>Staff line up classes and walk to:</p> <p>Name: Muster point</p> <p>Type of venue:KS2 playground and field</p> <p>Registers will be taken.</p>
<p>Security lockdown drills</p>	<p>Pupils will practise moving into the building for a lockdown termly.</p>

Lockdown drill action checklist

Use this checklist to take actions and record them during a lockdown. Recording the time could be especially useful during drills to practise going through these actions at pace. In an emergency, use the actions listed to help you make sure nothing is missed.

Step	Time	Signed
Sound alarm/signal and begin lockdown procedure		
Dial 999 and alert emergency services		

Direct all children, staff, parents/carers and visitors to the nearest safe place (this may be dependent on what and where the risk is)		
Account for pupils, staff and visitors using registers		
Secure rooms by locking doors and windows, and take action to increase protection as set out in the plan		
Close blinds and curtains		
Turn off the lights, fans and/or mobile air conditioning units		
Direct all children, staff, parents/carers and visitors to hide, including under desks and away from windows		
Stay as silent as possible – put any mobile phones on silent.		
Make sure everyone is aware of an exit point in case an intruder gains access		
If possible, check and search for missing or injured pupils, staff or visitors		
Keep doors and windows locked shut and remain inside until the all clear has been given, or until you're told to evacuate by the emergency services
